Definition of Recidivism

Background:

Assembly Bill 1050 amended Section 6027 of the Penal Code to require the BSCC to: "Develop definitions of key terms, including, but not limited to, 'recidivism,' and any other terms deemed relevant in order to facilitate consistency in local data collection, evaluation, and implementation of evidence-based practices, promising evidence-based practices, and evidence-based programs." The following definition was approved by the BSCC.

BSCC Definition of Recidivism:

"Recidivism is defined as conviction of a new felony or misdemeanor committed within three years of release from custody or committed within three years of placement on supervision for a previous criminal conviction¹."

1 "Committed" refers to the date of offense, not the date of conviction.


Orange County Board of Supervisors Definition of Recidivism:

The following definition was approved by the Orange County Board of Supervisors on February 26, 2019:


"A conviction of a new felony or misdemeanor; or a sustained parole or probation violation based on a new criminal offense; or any lawful arrest that led to the filing of a law, probation or parole violation based on new criminal offense. Recidivism shall include any of the foregoing offenses committed within three years of release from custody, three years of placement on supervision, or three years after termination of supervision."


General breakdown of jail population




General intensity map of Mental Health/Substance Use Disorder population





Overlay- display of complexity of population level topics
