

The County of Orange Realignment Summit will present current evidence-based research and outcomes regarding reentry and recidivism in Orange County. The Summit is convening a cross section of local stakeholders, to provide information of the impact of Realignment and its challenges. This will be an exciting opportunity to share empirical data, identify best practices and model programs that enhance public safety.

GOALS

- Educate relevant stakeholders regarding Realignment and the impact of incarceration and recidivism in Orange County.
- Consider an 'action agenda' for collaborative partnerships to address the barriers faced by the incarcerated that have a desire to successfully reintegrate into local communities.

OBJECTIVES

- Inform community partners, who will explore relevant approaches and solutions.
- Establish profiles and processes that give ex-felons the best chance of re-entering communities without returning to jail.
- Develop positive working relationships between law enforcement and stakeholders, as it relates to Realignment.

THE PUBLIC SAFETY REALIGNMENT ACT

In an effort to address overcrowding in California's prisons and assist in alleviating the state's financial crisis, the Public Safety Realignment Act (Realignment), pursuant to AB 109, was signed into law on April 4, 2011 and took effect October 1, 2011. Realignment made some of the largest and pivotal changes to the criminal justice system in California. Generally speaking, Realignment transferred the responsibility of supervision to the 58 counties for felons (excluding high risk sex offenders) released from prison whose commitment offenses are statutorily defined as non-serious and non-violent. Offenders convicted after October 1, 2011 who have no current or prior statutorily defined serious, violent, or sex-offending convictions are to serve time locally (regardless of length of sentence) with the possibility of community supervision in place of time spent in custody.

Realignment established the Postrelease Community Supervision classification of supervision, altered the parole revocation process with more responsibility in local jurisdictions, gave local law enforcement the freedom to manage offenders in a more cost-effective manner and charged the Community Corrections Partnerships (CCPs) with planning and implementing Realignment in their community as of October 1, 2011. Effective July 1, 2013, parole violations are housed, prosecuted and tried locally. This legislation created an unprecedented opportunity for all 58 California counties to determine an appropriate level of supervision and services to address both the needs and risks of individuals released from prison and local jails into the community. With the passage of Proposition 30 in 2012, Realignment is ensured a continuous source of funding.

Speaker Biographies

ALPHABETICAL ORDER

CHRIS BIEBER, Chief Deputy Probation Officer, Orange County Probation Department

Chris Bieber is the Chief Deputy Probation Officer in Orange County, with oversight of the Field Operations Bureau, including the Post Release Community Supervision Division (AB109). He has been with the department for 27 years and has served in multiple assignments ranging from juvenile institutions, field supervision, and gang violence suppression. His span of control includes nearly 400 staff in five divisions and thirty-six operational units.

JEFF BROUWER, Lieutenant, Newport Beach Police Department

Jeff Brouwer began his law enforcement career with the Los Angeles Police Department and joined the Newport Beach Police Department in 2000. Lieutenant Brouwer has worked in a variety of assignments, including Motors, Background Investigator, Polygraph Examiner, Recruitment Officer, Reserve Coordinator, Crisis Negotiation Supervisor, Patrol Sergeant, Personnel and Training Sergeant, and Detective Lieutenant. He is currently assigned as the Executive Officer in the Office of the Chief of Police.

SANDRA HUTCHENS, Orange County Sheriff-Coroner

Sandra Hutchens is the Sheriff-Coroner for Orange County. She leads more than 3,800 sworn and professional staff who serve in Patrol Operations, Criminal and Special Investigations, the County's Crime Lab and Courts, Coroner's Office, as well as the eighth largest jail system in the nation. The department provides vital public safety services to more than 700,000 residents within the county's unincorporated areas and via contract to thirteen municipal cities, the County's three harbors, John Wayne Airport, and the Orange County Transportation Agency.

MAGNUS LOFSTROM, Senior Fellow, Public Policy Institute of California

Dr. Magnus Lofstrom was an Assistant Professor of Economics at the University of Texas at Dallas. He has served as a researcher at the Institute for the Study of Labor at the University of Bonn and at the University of California, Irvine. Dr. Lofstrom's work has been published in the Journal of Human Resources, Demography, Small Business Economics, Economics of Education Review, Journal of Population Economics and Industrial Relations and in numerous edited volumes. His research interests include immigration, self-employment, education, welfare and earnings inequality, and demography.

FRANK OSPINO, Orange County Public Defender

Frank Ospino is currently the Public Defender of the County of Orange. In his role as Public Defender, he leads the department in its mission of providing high quality legal representation in a cost-effective manner to approximately 80,000 clients annually. He currently oversees a staff of approximately 390 employees, including 200 attorneys. Mr. Ospino began his law career serving the County of Orange as a Deputy Public Defender in 1985.

LINDA PENNER, Executive Officer, California Board of State & Community Corrections

Linda Penner was Chief Probation Officer for the County of Fresno from 2005 to 2012. She has served as a member of the Board of State and Community Corrections since 2012 and its predecessor, the Corrections Standards Authority Board, from 2007 until 2012. She serves on the State Advisory Committee on Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, underneath the Board, since 2007. In 2011, Ms. Penner served as the president of the Probation Officers Association of California.

GREGG PRICKETT, Judge, Orange County Superior Court

Judge Prickett began his legal career in the LA District Attorney's Office in 1980 and then the Orange County District Attorney's Office in 1982. In 1995, Governor Pete Wilson appointed him as a Judge to the North Orange County Municipal Court. In 1999, he was elevated to the Orange County Superior Court, where he continues to serve and has been presiding over felony trials. Judge Prickett is an adjunct professor who began teaching at Chapman University Fowler School of Law in 2009.

TONY RACKAUCKAS, District Attorney

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Tony Rackauckas joined the Orange County District Attorney's Office in 1972 as a deputy district attorney, prosecuting homicide cases and felony trials including rape, robbery, arson, assault, burglary, fraud, narcotics, and child molestation. After briefly working in private practice, he was appointed as a Municipal Court Judge in 1990 and three years later, to the Superior Court, where he was named Presiding Judge of its Appellate Department in 1996. In June 1998, he was elected District Attorney, becoming the first person from outside the OCDA to be elected District Attorney in more than 40 years.

KEVIN RANEY, Chief of Police, Garden Grove

Kevin Raney began his career with the Garden Grove Police Department in 1976 as a 19-year old police cadet. He became an officer in January 1978. In 1986, he was promoted to sergeant, in 1991 to lieutenant, and later to captain in 2002. In 2005, he was named the Department's Deputy Chief. In January 2011, Kevin Raney filled the Department's highest position by becoming Garden Grove's 11th Chief of Police. Chief Raney is credited with initiating the opening of the Department's Juvenile Justice Center in 1998.

STEVEN J. SENTMAN, Chief Probation Officer, Orange County Probation Department

Steven Sentman is the Chief Probation Officer in Orange County. He has been with the department for almost 30 years and has served in multiple assignments ranging from juvenile institutions, field supervision, sex crimes and gang violence suppression. In 2010, Chief Sentman was sworn in as Orange County's 14th Chief Probation Officer. He manages a budget of \$170 million and approximately 1,286 sworn and non sworn staff. He is an active member of the Chief Probation Officer's of California participating in several state wide working committees.

TODD SPITZER, Orange County Board of Supervisors, Third District

Todd Spitzer is a former California State Assembly Member and Orange County Supervisor who has dedicated his career to public service. He has previously served as a high school teacher, police officer and assistant district attorney. He was first elected to public office in 1992, and now serves as Supervisor of the Third District of the Orange County Board of Supervisors. Crime Victims United of California named then Assemblyman Spitzer "Legislator of the Year," as did the California Coalition Against Sexual Assault, citing his extensive work with Megan's Law and his dedication to protecting victims of sexual assault.

QUINCY THACKER, Chief Deputy Regional Administrator, California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, Division of Adult Parole Operations

Quincy Thacker started his correctional career 16 years ago as a Correctional Officer at California State Prison Los Angeles County. In 1999, he transferred to DAPO as a Parole Agent and promoted through the ranks. He worked in various field offices within the Los Angeles County as well as being assigned to the Fugitive Apprehension Team. He is currently the Chief Deputy Regional Administrator for the Southern Region (Los Angeles, San Bernardino, Riverside, Orange, Imperial and San Diego Counties).

FY 14-15

(a) Undistributed Allocation, originally estimated at \$1.25M, was reduced to \$500,000 as part of the FY 14-15 Budget. This amount is distributed evenly between the DA and Public Defender. The remaining \$750,000 of the original \$1.25M is proposed to be redistributed between Sheriff and HCA (In-Custody). It is assumed that HCA (Risk Pool), the District Attorney and Public Defender will retain all carryover funds up to FY 14-15, which should cover most of their AB109 shortfall for FY 14-15. However, in the event they exhaust those resources during the year, CEO/Budget will work with them to address the shortfall during the Third Quarter Budget Report. Based on preliminary calculations from the Public Defender and DA, it appears that an adjustment will be needed, but the exact amount will be determined during the year.

(b) FY 14-15 Growth Money was conservatively projected at \$4M. Initial RAC allocations indicated \$50.8M Statewide for growth, later revised to \$73.2M. It is assumed that the Sheriff will again have an AB109-related operational shortfall in and consequently would be the recipient of any growth money allocated, assuming HCA In-Custody's shortfall is covered by the risk pool funding. Revised FY 14-15 Allocations will be discussed and agreed to by Financial managers, then presented to CCP approval.

(c) LLE is allocated 1% of the Original Allocation for FY 14-15, as approved by the CCP. In addition, individual cities were permitted to carry over any unspent money from the FY 13-14 allocation.

FY 15-16 Notes

(a) Base allocation was determined by the base percentage formula as developed by the State/RAC. The revised base methodology is calculated by the following percentage factors: 45% Caseload (22.5% Jail/1170(h); 22.5% Probation PRCS & Felony), 45% Crime and Population (22.5% Part 1 crimes; 22.5% County Population), and 10% Special Factors (Poverty, small county minimums, impacts of State prisons), which lowered Orange County's % of the Statewide allocation from 6.75% to 6.39% (for details on Orange County's base calculation, see table 1).

(b) Performance Growth allocations are based 80% on Probation Performance and 20% on Incarceration factors. To mitigate reductions in the first year (drop year) the State allocated one-time growth funding for transition (\$5,983,336) and stabilization (\$2,102,945). The transition funding is allocated to Counties who received less than 100% of the blended rate to allow them to level out funding and smooth the reduction over the years. The stabilization is also to assist counties to level off funding from the drop year (FY 15-16). This funding has been set aside for future allocation determination based on programmatic needs.

(c) Financial Managers agreed to split the performance growth funding is using the FY 13-14 percent of Sheriff and HCA In-Custody's actual year-

end shortfalls, to be revisited each year for future growth splits.

FY 16-17 Notes

(a) The statewide base allocation is projected to increase however our % of the split is level to the FY 14-15 percent. The base allocation is split between the departments based on FY 14-15 percentage allocations.

(b) Performance Growth is a conservative estimate based on past history. The State will determine the split of growth based solely on performance.

FY 17-18

Estimates for base and growth percentages and allocations are held level to the FY 16-17 estimates as final percentages and allocations will not be available until future State Budgets are released and probation and incarceration performance results are available.

- (a) Based on discussions with impacted financial managers, the Balance Allocation (originally estimated at \$1.25M) will be reduced to only \$500,000 as part of the FY 14-15 Budget. This balance amount will be distributed evently (\$250,000 each) to the DA and Public Defender. The remaining \$750,000 (of the original \$1.25M) is proposed to be redistributed between the Sheriff and HCA (In-Custody). It is assumed that HCA (Risk Pool), the District Attorney and Public Defender will retain all carryover funds up to FY 14-15, which should cover most of their AB109 shortfall for FY 14-15. However, in the event they exhaust those resources during the year, CEO/Budget will work with them to address the shortfall during the Third Quarter Budget Report. Based on preliminary calculations from the Public Defender and DA, it appears that an adjustment will be needed, but the exact amount will be determined during the year.
- (b) Department financial managers conservatively project that the amount of FY 13-14 Growth Money that will be distributed in Sept/Oct. of 2014 will be approximately \$4M. It is assumed that the Sheriff and HCA (In-Custody) will again have an AB109-related operational shortfall in the current fiscal year (FY 13-14) and consequently should be the recipients of any growth money allocated. Thus, with CCP approval, HCA and the Sheriff plan to include these projected growth monies in their FY 14-15 budget submittals. This is a change from prior years, when growth monies were not budgeted. Final approval for distribution of the FY 13-14 Growth Money can be returned to the CCP for approval once a final amount is distributed or, alternatively, staff can allocate the final amount according to the percentages shown in the chart under "Proposed 13-14 Growth Money Allocation."
- (c) LLE is allocated exactly 1% of the Total Allocation for the FY 14-15 Proposal. In addition, individual cities will be permitted to carry over any unspent money from the FY 13/14 allocation.

FY 14-15 Notes

Base and growth allocations will remain unchanged at this time. Variances from approved budget to State approved allocations will remain undistributed at this time and will be distributed during the 3rd quarter based on program need and CCP recommendation. Growth money is based on updated projections received from CSAC.




